REFLECTIONS ON 40 YEARS

A letter from Nancy Zallek, MAF Executive Director

In this annual report, we honor the Mankato Area Foundation's 40th anniversary and celebrate the past four decades of philanthropy in this community. We have the privilege of being able to present an interview with a board chair from each decade, along with a brief recap of the Foundation's activities at the time. Through their words, we can observe the changes that have helped us grow into the organization we are today.

Thinking back over our 40-year history was a unique opportunity for me. The Foundation was a frequent topic of conversation in our household because my mother, Gretchen Taylor, was one of the first board chairs, elected in 1974. From a very young age, I learned about the importance of philanthropy and the difference an organization like the Mankato Area Foundation can make in our community. I remember very well when the Foundation was founded—I was in middle school at the time—and some of the early projects. For example, I remember my mother combing the local terrain for boulders large enough to create a fountain for the new public library that was going to be built. Little did I know that I would one day follow in her footsteps. I haven't been sent out to look for boulders, but I am honored to be able to help new projects take shape in our community.

It is also an honor to see the continuing tradition of board chairs, board members and committee members who have volunteered countless hours to support this organization and the Mankato Area. Through the years, their stewardship has helped to make possible numerous landmark projects like that library fountain, including the Red Jacket Trail, Williams Nature Center, Fallenstein Field, Kiwanis Holiday Lights and the Children's Museum of Southern Minnesota. The Foundation has also contributed nearly four million dollars to groups like the YWCA, VINE, Habitat for Humanity, Greater Mankato Diversity Council, LEEP and the Mankato Symphony Orchestra—to name just a few. The goal has always been to help nonprofits continue to do their important work in our community.

It is obvious that a community foundation can play a critical role in supporting and promoting philanthropy. The surprise is how much fun it can be! I have the good fortune to spend my days working with generous and gracious individuals who want to give back to the place where they grew up, raised their families, found success in their work, and call home. They want to "give where they live" (or have lived important years of their lives).

I am proud that today's Mankato Area Foundation provides a creative and flexible philanthropic vehicle that helps our donors to personalize how they choose to make a difference.

Most of all, I want to take a moment to say thank you. Thank you to the founding members who realized the importance of creating a community foundation. Thank you to MAF board and committee members who have volunteered their time and have dedicated talent and treasures to make a difference. Thank you to our generous donors who have supported our work and the work of the nonprofit community. Thank you to our local nonprofits for understanding how to make this a better place to live, work and raise a family, and inviting us to partner with them in their efforts. Thank you, Mankato Area community builders.

1974-1983

THE FIRST DECADE

Incorported on June 10, 1974, the Foundation was the formalization of an idea brought to Mankato by Paul Hadley, who had attended a school for Chamber Executives. The school promoted the importance of having a place where people could donate money for the betterment of the community. MAF began its work with a volunteer board and without paid staff. Instead, the dues–paying Directors were people in the community who wanted to make Mankato and the surrounding area a better place

During the first decade of MAF, the Board members worked hard to share their vision, increase community support and raise significant donations. Through this "community chest" model, the Foundation was able to successfully undertake a variety of projects. Many of the projects from the first decade had large impacts on life in our community. These notable projects include the rock and fountain area at the Blue Earth County Library, the Williams Nature Center, the Public Affairs Institute, Leadership Mankato Area and the MSU, Mankato South Central Regional Science Fair.

The 1970s saw the United States concerned about our environment, energy consumption and our economy in new ways. Earth Day, first celebrated in 1970, and the Arab Oil Embargo of 1973-74 were part of our collective experience. The Mankato Area Foundation helped our community explore, learn and discuss energy choices by sponsoring the Public Affairs Institute that held two seminars at MSU, Mankato in 1977 and 1979. The seminars asked, "Minnesota: How Will We Spend Our Future?" Extremely

THE SECOND DECADE

The founding members stressed a need for a community foundation in which people could donate money for significant projects and the betterment of the community, and receive charitable contributions from wills and estates. During the second decade of the Mankato Area Foundation, the "community chest" model continued and the Foundation's leadership became proactive in fund raising for specific initiatives and local projects and programming.

From 1984 to 1993, our world was rapidly changing. The Cold War was ending, the Berlin Wall falling and MTV showed music videos 24-hours a day, and MAF continued to help change our community for good. Some of the many projects included supporting Walk Around Downtown Beautification, the Dakota Indian Statue, Lincoln Park Restoration, the Carnegie Arts Center, the Mankato Youth Symphony and the Lancer Marching Band, and establishing the Wilson Scholarship Fund and the Ogden and Jane Confer Scholarship Fund.


During this time, the Mankato Area

THE THIRD DECADE

The Mankato Area Foundation continued growing during its third decade of partnering, giving and building a better community for all in the greater Mankato and North Mankato area. In December of 1994, a donation of \$423,000 to the Mankato Area Foundation was received from the Confer family. This donation nearly tripled the funds MAF had available. The effects of this gift were three-fold: more and larger grants could be given, funding began to include expanded social causes, and a need emerged to develop a more structured Board governance system.

The third decade, 1994 to 2003, saw dramatic changes in the world around us. The United States economy improved and strengthened and the Dow Jones industrial average closed above 10,000 for the first time ever on March 29, 1999. Technology changed how we communicated and life

moved faster! Mankato Area Foundation flourished and maintained its commitment to shape our community for good through grants that continued to support the core funding priorities of education, culture, recreation, civics and aesthetics. The Mankato Symphony Orchestra's Steinway was restored, Merely Players received new portable lighting, Guthrie on Tour was supported and House of Hope and the Family Resource Center received financial support. Youth leadership was supported with grants to Youth In Government and Junior Achievement.


These and many other grants continued the work of the previous two decades, and Mankato Area Foundation also worked cooperatively with external groups such as Leave a Legacy and the Guthrie Theatre.

In August, 2000, Thin Film Technology approached MAF, seeking a partner to assist them in making a sizable community donation. In early 2001, Thin Film Technology donated \$1,000,000 to the Foundation as a designated donor advised fund. This relationship has grown over the years and the community continues to enjoy the many positive impacts, such as supporting a local Robotics team and a summer camp held at South Central College for students interested in Mechatronics, Global Information Systems and Bio Science.

This decade began and ended with major gifts, one private and one corporate, that set the stage for the Mankato Area Foundation's rapid growth as we entered the 21st Century.

THE FOURTH DECADE

During Mankato Area Foundation's fourth decade of shaping our community for good, MAF was able to use funds from a beguest left to the Foundation from Al and Erla Fallenstein to support various key community initiatives. Al and Erla were passionate about parks and asked the Foundation to support parks in Mankato and North Mankato as well as use their contribution for the betterment of both communities. In 2006, the Foundation collaborated with North Mankato to create the Fallenstein Field as a home for our local Miracle League. Soon after the Miracle Field was completed, and knowing that Erla had particularly loved Sibley Park, the Foundation chose to partner with the City of Mankato to renovate the Sibley Park Zoo. Most recently, we were able to honor their passion for the holiday season by sponsoring Kiwanis Holiday Lights—also in Sibley Park. Through their generous gift to the Foundation, the Fallenstein family made a lasting impact and enriched the quality of life in this community for decades to come.

Although the Fallenstein family chose to leave their legacy in a bequest to the Foundation, other donors enjoy participating in their philanthropy. In this same decade, a relationship was developed with the Dotson family that led to the creation of the Dotson Family Donor Advised Fund. Through that Fund, Mankato Area Foundation was able to grant a gift of \$500,000 to the Children's Museum of Southern Minnesota. The following year, the Dotson Family Donor Advised Fund donated a skating rink, in memory of their matriarch Mary Dotson, so that visitors to Sibley Park could participate in her favorite activity-under the brilliance of Kiwanis Holiday Lights.

During the fourth decade, the Foundation supported numerous nonprofits as well as key cornerstone projects. This fourth decade exemplifies the ability of the Foundation to connect philanthropic interests with community needs and our goal to enhance the livability of this area.

FUND TYPES

Community Foundations are a creative and flexible means for community-based philanthropy. Donors who want to give back to "Main Street" have a myriad of options. The role of the Mankato Area Foundation is to assist donors in structuring their gifts so both the donor and the community benefit from their charitable generosity.

A donor advised fund is popular among donors who choose to participate directly in the grantmaking process by making recommendations for grants to specific organizations from the fund. A donor's advisor may also work closely with the staff of the Foundation to match donors with a particular community need.

A fund designed to support one or more specifically chosen charities is a **designated fund**. By working through the Foundation, donors are protected if a charity changes its mission or type of services, or even dissolves. In this case, the Foundation directs grants to an organization with a mission similar to the donor's stated intent. Ultimately, the donor supports the organizations he or she chooses but ensures that the gift will remain relevant over time.

When a donor desires to establish a fund for a specified, broad purpose, a **field of interest fund** is the appropriate choice. Donors with particular issues of concern, i.e. senior services, arts and culture, or homelessness, may focus their giving by setting up this type of fund. The Foundation then makes grants to meet current needs in the specified field.

Several of our donors have chosen to establish a **scholarship fund** to honor a loved one or simply as a way to assist young people with educational goals.

An unrestricted fund is one of the most flexible ways to give, since it may be used for any purpose approved by the MAF Board of Directors. This fund allows the Foundation to identify community needs and award grants designed to address those needs.

Agency funds can be or have been established at the Foundation by nonprofit organizations that appreciate the fund management expertise of the Foundation's committee structure and Board of Directors. Some of the funds are already established permanent endowments; some act as a reserve fund for the charities.



BUILDING A SENSE OF PLACE

The Children's Museum of Southern Minnesota has had a long relationship with the Mankato Area Foundation. As The Children's Museum of Southern Minnesota prepares to open in its permanent home in 2015, Executive Director Peter Olson gratefully noted, "Mankato Area Foundation has been a key partner in strategically placing their support just when we needed it the most to be able to take that next big step forward."

Beginning nearly a decade ago with a grant to look at the possibility of having a children's museum, Mankato Area Foundation has supported the vision of providing offerings for families with young children in Mankato that were affordable, educational and available to enjoy year round. For that reason, the Foundation funded the feasibility study that helped an enthusiastic group of volunteers determine if the dream of a children's museum in this community was a viable initiative.

When the Children's Museum of Southern Minnesota began their capital campaign, *Every Penny Counts*, they needed a video to share with potential donors. Mankato Area Foundation funded the 4-minute video and the dollars spent were multiplied many times over in the capital campaign.

In June of 2013, the Mankato Area Foundation made a \$500,000 gift to the Children's Museum of Southern Minnesota through the Dotson Family Fund of the Mankato Area Foundation. Denny and Carole Dotson are also loaning a 1917 Little Giant Tractor that will be the centerpiece of the Grow It Gallery. In addition, The Dotson Back 40 will provide outdoor space for imaginative, unstructured play for children, with tree stumps, knolls to climb and openness to spark imaginations.

When reflecting on the Dotson's generosity and the ability of Mankato Area Foundation to facilitate gifts that greatly benefit our community, Olson said, "In many ways, when you come to this museum it will be a reflection of our shared culture, our heritage, our way of life, our art, our industry. We will be celebrating and honoring who has made this way of life possible, that we all enjoy here in Mankato. So, we are thrilled to have Denny and Carole Dotson and the Dotson family, with their long heritage of industry and philanthropy, partner with the Mankato Area Foundation to create a permanent investment in this community.

THE POWER TO BELIEVE: ESTABLISHING THE FIRST WOMEN'S FUND IN THE AREA

The Mankato YWCA has been recognizing, developing and celebrating the lives of women and girls in our community for 87 years. The time had come for the YWCA to create a fund for the long-term sustainability of the organization. After researching the best practices of creating a designated fund and looking at several foundations, the YWCA found that partnering with the Mankato Area Foundation was the preeminent choice. According to Barb Dorn, Executive Director of the YWCA, "The Mankato Area Foundation had the right people, the right vision, and provided the right opportunity!"

With the goal of raising \$1.5 million for the YWCA's Women's Fund through *The Power To Believe* campaign, Dorn feels that "working with Mankato Area Foundation to build the YWCA Women's Fund gives us much more credibility with donors of the capacity to leave a legacy."

Dorn sees great possibilities in offering the YWCA Women's Fund to potential donors. "I think it is hard for donors who have an interest in leaving a large gift, to leave those large gifts to a nonprofit when it is going to the general fund every year. There is a perception that it might get frittered away on operating expenses. If they were to give to a long-term fund such as the Women's Fund, that gift will live on in perpetuity and it will sustain us through the revenue stream out of that investment. We needed to look at not only growing but sustaining this organization long into the future and the answer to that was The Women's Fund—a long-term fund in partnership with Mankato Area Foundation."

"We feel very fortunate to be working with Mankato Area Foundation—an organization that sees opportunities and has a vision like we do."

THE MARY DOTSON **SKATING RINK**

The Mary Dotson Skating Rink is a feature attraction of the Kiwanis Holiday Lights display, of which the Mankato Area Foundation has been a major sponsor since 2012.

For over 50 years, Mary Dotson, or Grandma Dotson as she was known to many, provided a skating rink and hot cocoa to neighborhood children in the Oak Knoll neighborhood of Mankato. The Mankato Area Foundation was pleased to use the Dotson Family Designated Fund to purchase a synthetic material skating rink that community members will be able to enjoy for years—regardless of the weather and varying temperatures.

"I am very pleased we can honor my mother in this way," said Denny Dotson. "She cared deeply for children and loved parks and skating rinks. Adding this new rink to a jewel of a park like Sibley is such a wonderful way to celebrate her life and her passions."
